

Below is some information about four different types of sentence. Make sure you understand the different types of sentence and the punctuation that goes with them.

# 1. Statements

A statement is a sentence that tells you a fact or piece of information.

Statements end with a full stop.

In a statement the subject comes before the verb.

Example: A triangle has three sides.

# 2. Questions

A question is a sentence that asks for information.

Questions usually end with a question mark.

In a question the subject comes after the verb.

Example: Does a triangle have three sides?

# 3. Commands

A command is a sentence that gives an order or instruction.

Commands can end with an exclamation mark or a full stop.

The subject of a statement is usually implied (the person receiving the command).

Example: Take your muddy shoes off now!

# 4. Exclamations

An exclamation expresses strong emotions; often surprise.

Exclamations end with an exclamation mark.

Exclamations often start with 'What' or 'How'

Example: What an amazing sunset!

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

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
